## **Girls in STEM Symposium**

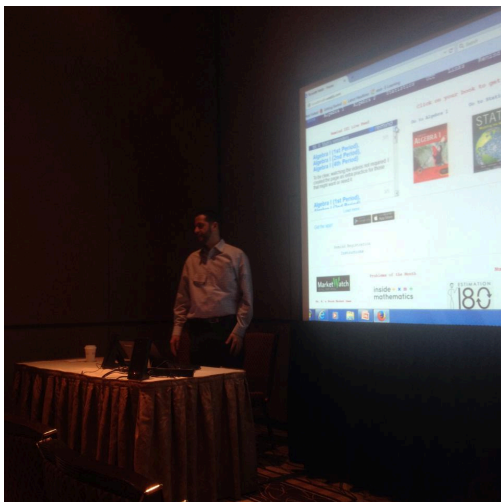
On March 25th students from the Educational Technology Leadership Doctoral Program participated in the "Girls in Technology Symposium" at Hudson County

Tina Bacolas is a teacher, supervisor, innovator, entrepreneur, and alumnus of the MA in Educational Technology.



After 6 years in the classroom teaching high school sciences, Tina Bacolas completed her Master's Degree in Educational Technology and delved into her true passion, professional development. She went from Technology Coach to her current position of Instructional Technology Supervisor at Park Ridge Jr./Sr. High School.

Tina also established a business that specializes in selling quick-release window treatments for classroom doors in schools--the Hideaway Helper--and sells it through her

company [School Safety Solutions](#). She developed this product as a solution in her classroom, patented it, and now oversees the manufacturing and sales.

School Safety Solution's mission includes the improvement of lockdown drills procedures for better preparedness. To date, the Hideaway Helper safety shade hangs in over 700 schools and colleges in 47 states. As a Virginia Tech alumnus who was present at the 2007 massacre, school safety is a priority to Ms. Bacolas and one of her passions.

## NJCU Hosted NJEDge Best Practices

On March 13th NJCU hosted the NJEDge Best Practices Showcase. There were over 150 participants from across the state, with over 30 Breakout Sessions and 25 Poster Sessions, making this the largest and most dynamic Best Practices Showcase in the event's 16-year history.
